NOVEMBER SPEAKER: Mark Freeman

Mark Freeman will present "Families and Flowers" at the November 19, 2003 meeting. His topic deals with the challenges facing the flower-growing industry in Northern San Diego County - a story of immigrants and entrepreneurs; of continuity and change; and of self-sufficiency and adaptability. The Ecke, Tayama/Kimura, and Weidner families are profiled.

Mark, a documentary film and video maker with over twentyfive years of experience, is an Assistant Professor of Television,

Film and New Media in the School of Theatre, Television and Film at San Diego State University. He has produced, directed, written and edited programs for broadcast on national public television. His documentaries have won numerous awards including a Gold Apple at the National Educational Film and Video Festival, a Certificate of Merit at the Chicago International Film Festival, and a Red Ribbon at the American Film and Video Festival.



Mark's productions are found in the collections of libraries and universities throughout the country, and have screened at museums including the Smithsonian Institute's National Museum of Natural History, the American Museum of Natural History, and the New York Museum of Modern Art.

Many thanks to Karl Grobl for taking the place of our scheduled October speaker, Bob Jacobson, who had to be out of town. Karl was scheduled to be a presenter early next year and graciously accepted our invitation to "come early and be heard." Karl's presentation was entitled "Photojournalism and Environmental Portraiture", and his compelling images of the human spirit quite literally touched our very souls.

By way of further introduction to Karl, he is an award-winning photojournalist who travels to the far corners of the world to tell

compelling picture stories that reveal the human side of issues faced by people across the globe. His images offer viewers intimate glimpses into the lives of ordinary people worldwide and provide an opportunity for us to reflect upon, and understand, their personal struggles and triumphs. With a keen awareness and reverence for human dignity, Karl creates photographs that not only educate and motivate, but also stir a viewer's deep emotion.



Karl Grobl specializes in humanitarian photojournalism, documenting the work of non-government organizations in the developing world. His most recent project was a year long documentary for Health Volunteers Overseas, a Washington, D.C. based healthcare provider with facilities in over 25 countries. Earlier this year, he also began work on a documentary about the struggles of daily life in Cuba.

MEMBER PROFILE: Richard & Twink Bumann

Twink and Richard Bumann are natives of San Diego's North County. They met during Richard's motorcycle racing career and have been an inseparable team ever since. They reside on Richard's grandfather's ranch in Olivenhain, which was homesteaded in 1886. They have two children and three grandchildren.

Twink and Richard Bumann started their photographic hobby as an outgrowth from scuba diving. Richard was using 8MM

underwater cameras in the early 1960's and for a short time used 16MM. Then in 1982, Twink and Richard switched to 35MM underwater cameras. Initially, they used the Nikonos

camera/strobe system and later upgraded to housed Nikon systems with remote self



contained strobes. The Bumann's photographic skills were tested each month during competition at the San Diego Underwater Photographic Society. Both progressed from novice to advanced photographers and they were eventually awarded honorary membership into the SDUPS. During their fifteen years of underwater photography, Twink and Richard visited many dive locations including California's Channel Islands, Mexico, Caribbean, Philippines, Malaysia and others. The Bumanns have presented underwater slide shows at UCSD and the San Diego Civic Theater. Each showing had audiences of over one thousand people. Additionally, Twink and Richard have photos in magazines and three published books.

The Bumanns transformed from underwater photographers to top-side nature/landscape photography in 1996. Underwater housings were traded for long lenses and the new challenge of bird, reptile and mammal photography began. The former restrictions of bottom time (usually four hours per day) and exotic locations no longer applied. They could photograph from macro to wide angle to telephoto by simply reaching into the camera bag.

Twink and Richard have been members of NCPS for about five years.

Other digital services include high resolution film and flatbed scanning, or output on the Lasergraphics film recorder of Powerpoint slides, black and white or color negatives.

Other services include: large format printing up to 60 inches wide, and output onto different media such as canvas, textured fine art paper, giclee, prints and photographic paper using UV inks for image stability.
