NOVEMBER PROGRAM (Nov. 28, 2007) A Top Marine Photographer Visits NCPS by Carrie Barton

Programs Director Note: As you all know by now, our October meeting was cancelled due to fire, chaos, and Quail Gardens being closed! Barbara Swanson will be filling us in on how the extended member share may still come into play in the near future. But for now, hopefully we are all safe and sound and getting back in the swing of things, and we will be meeting as planned on Novermber 28th (no date shift this Nov. because Thanksgiving lands in a more convenient placement for us this year!).

Following on the footsteps then of our rather unusual September presenter (forensic photographer, John Farrell) is another, out of the ordinary, speaker. Cpl. Ray Lewis, from the Camp Pendleton Marines, will be volunteering his time with us that evening. That, alone, is a special thing, but we are doubly honored to have THE Marine's "2006 Photojournalist of the Year" share his images and experience with us! He, and his fellow Marine photographers, have taken some outstanding images, which you can view by exploring this link:

Cpl. Lewis is also the Press Chief for the Camp Pendleton Scout, which is the official weekly newspaper of the Camp Pendleton Marine Corps Base.

And while this is again a departure from our normal venues (standard portraiture, landscape, wildlife, etc.), it is a continued foray into the extremely varied

worlds of photography. John Farrell gave us a good grasp of what his job entailed, and entertained us along the way. I'm sure Cpl. Lewis will do likewise. And one last note: This presentation is not a political forum but rather a glimpse at the experiences of a military photojournalist.

And from a story Marines Magazine wrote on Cpl. Lewis when he was deployed to Iraq:

Cpl. Ray Lewis sticks to one rule when performing as a combat correspondent: "Never limit myself to the last shoot. I'll get dirty if I have to. The riflemen do it, so why should I be exempt? If you don't take risks, you won't know how far you can go," said Lewis, who graduated from El Camino High School in Oceanside, Calif., in 2000 and attended ITT Technical Institute in San Diego.

After receiving his associate's degree in computer-aided drafting in 2003, he worked in fast food for a little while before deciding his life needed more discipline. So like any hard-charger, he went to his local Marine Corps recruiting office and signed up.

"I went home, told my mom, and she was horrified," said Lewis. "My mom thought, with all my education, I should have joined the Air Force." When telling the Marine Corps story, Lewis tries foremost to focus on the ground troops.

"A fellow combat correspondent once told me 'You got to tell their story, man. It's important because they might not come back," said Lewis, currently stationed in Iraq with 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, Regimental Combat Team 5. "He was so passionate about it, and he was right. I didn't really understand what he meant until my battalion lost a Marine."

Lewis assumes his role in the infantry battalion with great relish: "Who in their right minds would dodge bullets and bombs just to take a picture? Me, that's who. I appreciate each crazy moment because some civilians would love to be this close to Marines in combat."

MEMBER SHARE by Barbara Swanson

November's topic for Membershare is "Skies". Please bring up to two images to share.

This topic emphasizes how powerful a sky can be. Unusual lighting, fantastic clouds, or a mix of rain and light can be wonderful subjects. When seeing a sky that looks worthy of photographing, one of the first things to decide is whether the sky should be the whole subject or one of several important elements in the picture. What aspects of the sky do you want to emphasize--color, cloud texture, mood? Then decide what composition would best serve this. Is it a wide-angle scenic to show the clouds in the landscape, or a close-up of a cloud backlit by the sun at sunset? You can get very different compositions depending on what you choose to include or exclude.

Correct exposure can sometimes be difficult. If the sun is incorporated into the picture, you usually want to meter off to the side to get good tonalities from the sky. You also need to be aware of lens flare (prevent this by shading your lens). If there are white clouds, be careful not to overexpose them, which would result in a loss of detail in the clouds. If the sky is only part of the picture, to correctly expose the sky may mean the rest of the picture is underexposed. Sometimes this is effective, such as having a silhouette. Other times, you may either need to use a split-grad filter to bring the exposures closer together, or with a digital camera take several exposures at different settings and then blend them together in the digital darkroom, or take the picture in RAW and process it twice. Another time when exposures can be difficult is after sunset, when the exposures are very long. In general, bracketing your exposures in any of these situations is a good idea so that you can pick the best one.

Unfortunately, living along the coast in southern California often means having rather bland skies, but there are times, especially in the winter, when the skies here can be strong subjects. I notice that when I travel to other places, I am now quite fascinated by how many clouds there are. When I lived with constant clouds, I didn't appreciate them as much. This makes me more aware of them, and makes me think more on how to best incorporate them into a photograph. Some of my favorite places to have the sky be a major element in the picture are by water

(such as the ocean), where I can also get reflections from the sky, or in the mountains, where there can be so many clouds.

There is no formal meeting in December, so the following membershare will be in January. Because of the wildfires causing our October meeting to be only take-in of the pictures for the show, we were not able to share the presentations put together by our members. Instead, we will use those presentations for our January membershare. As we won't have quite as much time as planned, I would suggest that the presentations be a little shorter if possible.

Advice from the Judges by Mike McMahon

As you know, we were very fortunate to have Jack Davis and Robert Turner as our judges for this year's Member Show. They were great to work with and generous with their time. When we asked for constructive feedback, they were happy to oblige. I'll summarize their comments below.

Best Foot Forward

The judges approached our Show as a fine-art photography show. They carefully looked at details in the prints and took note of the quality of the mattes and frames. They spotted gaps in panorama-stitching work and were disappointed to hear that a significant number of frames required repair in order to be hung. This should remind us to take the time to professionally present our work...it makes a difference. Although they awarded ribbons to some Gatorboard-only presentations, they felt that the work suffered in comparison to glass-framed images.

A Little Goes a Long Way

In several cases, they pointed out images that had been overworked (e.g. excessively filtered, sharpened, etc. in Photoshop). They reminded us that a little adjustment goes a long way and that the image needs to be fundamentally sound in order to be effective in competition.

What Makes an Image a Winner?

Understanding that every judge approaches an image with his own frame of reference and preference, a few themes were evident. The judges posed the following questions as they evaluated the work: What story is this image telling us? What kind of mood / emotion / sense of place does this communicate? Images that set a mood and/or told a strong story rose above the others.

Grab Shot or Fine-art Photograph?

In several cases, the judges wished that the artist had worked more with the subject at hand. A slight change in angle, for example, could have strengthened the composition and/or eliminated a distracting background. Shooting at a different time of day would have improved a number of images.

Aesthetic Point of View

Sometimes it's easy to get caught up in the technology of photography and forget about the artistic content. Visiting museums and galleries can strengthen our understanding of composition, the use

of light and dark, and aesthetic point of view. Setting aside megapixels and print profiles for a moment... fine-art photography, first and foremost, is art.

Summary

So there you have it...a concentrated dose of advice from the experts. They congratulated us on our Show and look forward to staying in touch with our group. Please join me in thanking them for their valuable time and feedback.

Directions:

From the I-5, take Encinitas Blvd east. Go about 2-3 miles. At the bottom of the hill, go left/north on Rancho Santa Fe Rd (the sign may say Manchester, which is what the street would be called if you went to the right). Turn right/east on El Camino del Norte. Go over the bridge. Our street will be the first left/north after the bridge. 756 is on the top of the little hump. Park on the street.

From the I-15, take Via Rancho Parkway west. Turn left/south on Del Dios Hwy. Go about 3 miles. The next turn is hard to spot. Look for the rock announcing Rancho Santa Fe – you may see some cars turning in front of you. It will be a right/north turn on El Camino del Norte (by the RSF rock). Go about 2-3 miles. The next turn will be a bit hard to spot too! You'll go around a couple of rather sharp bends in the road. When the road starts to straighten, and you may be able to see a bridge further along, Val Sereno will be a right/north turn. 756 is on the top of the little hump. Park on the street.
